A scattered archipelago of some 900-odd richly forested mountainous islands and lowlying coral atolls, the Solomon Islands has been attracting international tourism since 1568 when Spanish explorer

Alvaro de Mendana first sailed into this tucked away corner of the South Pacific.

Mendana's legacy can still be found in the Solomon Islands today with many of the islands still bearing the Spanish names he gave them - Santa Isabel, San Cristóbal and perhaps the most famous of all, Guadalcanal, the name synonymous with World War II which takes its name from a small township in Andalucia in southern Spain.

But for the most part the Solomon Islands and their quiet, reserved people – a mix of Melanesian, Micronesian and Polynesian cultures - were left pretty much alone after Mendana's visit until 300 years later when Great Britain was given control of the entire territory.

Things changed dramatically during World War II and the Solomon Islands became a household name when the forces of Imperial Japan invaded, the region becoming the scene for some of the bloodiest battles in the Pacific theatre and most famously the battle of Guadalcanal when thousands of Japanese and US servicemen lost their lives. The British re-gained control in 1945 and in 1976, the Solomon Islands became self-governing before gaining full independence in 1978.

Little has changed in the Solomon Islands since then and it's thanks to this that the Solomon Islands have become such a breathtakingly fresh destination for those international travellers hardy enough to get off the beaten track and look for a new and very different experience.

Today World War II buffs and veterans and their families – mostly American and Japanese – SCUBA divers and surfers looking for the ultimate uncrowded wave, make up the bulk of the 25,000 or so international travellers who visit every year.

But the destination is fast attracting a brand new breed of travellers from around the world - family groups, honeymooners, sports fishermen, yachties, culture-lovers and simply those looking to make their own tracks. The newly emerging, multi-faceted Solomon Islands can pretty much cater to every taste, desire and budget with its myriad choice of accommodation - from the 'big gun' hotels of the capital Honiara to boutique resort accommodation, eco-lodges and home-stays dotted across the entire archipelago.

Best of all, and quite a surprise for many travellers, the Solomon Islands are very easy to reach – it takes less than three hours to reach the Solomon Islands' capital Honiara from Brisbane flying a sleek Solomon Airlines Airbus A 320 complete with full onboard service. 



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

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LOCATION

Centred at longitude 160 degrees east and latitude 9 degrees south of the equator, Solomon Islands comprises 992 islands of which 147 are inhabited.

These stretch 1448 kilometres (900 miles) in a south-easterly direction from the Shortland Islands on the border with Papua New Guinea on the northeast to the Santa Cruz Islands, which borders with Vanuatu on the southeast.

The archipelago covers an area of 461,000 sq km (249,000 sq nautical miles) of which 28,446 sq km (10,938 sq miles) is landmass.

The six biggest islands are Choiseul, New Georgia, Santa Isabel, Guadalcanal, Malaita and Makira.

On the atlas, Solomon Islands lie northeast of Australia and southwest of Hawaii.

Deeply forested mountainous islands add a towering contrast to low-lying coral atolls, right down to the tiny artificial islands built of coral and soil common on Malaita's northern coast.

HISTORY

Archaeological and linguistic evidence show that Solomon Islands was settled between 4000-5000 years ago by people from Southeast Asia.

From here, a group continued east and south settling in what is now known as Vanuatu, New Caledonia, Fiji and the Polynesian islands of Tonga and Samoa. It was not one way though as archaeologists point to a return migration of mainly Polynesians sometime later. Their descendants now live in atolls that border Solomon Islands' northern, southern and eastern boundaries.

It was not until the 16th century that the Europeans came to learn of the Solomon Islands.

Spanish explorer Álvaro de Mendana made the first contact in 1568. When he discovered alluvial gold on Guadalcanal, he thought he had found the source of King Solomon's (of the Bible fame) great wealth and named it the Isles of Solomon. It was through his influence that many of the islands in the archipelago bear original Spanish names.

After Mendana, others mainly Dutch and French explorers made forays into the group. Then it was the turn of the Germans and British.

The islands of New Georgia, Guadalcanal, Makira and Malaita became a British protectorate in 1893 with Tulagi proclaimed the protectorate capital in 1896.

The islands of Santa Cruz, Rennell and Bellona were included between 1898 and 1899. The Shortlands, Choiseul, Santa Isabel and Ontong Java were not part of the protectorate until 1900.

Japanese aggression turned the islands into a war theatre during World War II. Both the Japanese and allied forces suffered huge losses in land, sea and aerial battles.

Over 60 years later, the archipelago is littered with war wrecks and some of the country's infrastructures today like airstrips and roads owe their existence to the war.

Solomon Islands gained independence from Britain on July 7, 1978. Twenty years later, in 1998, tribal rivalries erupted into armed hostilities on Guadalcanal which prompted Australia and its Pacific Islands neighbours to launch RAMSI, the regional assistance mission to Solomon Islands, in July 2003. Hostilities have ended and the nation is back on track with an elected government in power.

PEOPLE

As Part of The Melanesian group of islands, which also includes Papua New Guinea, Vanuatu, New Caledonia and Fiji, the Solomon Islands was first settled by hunters and gatherers from Southeast Asia. Seafarers followed later.

Through the tracing of a distinct type of pottery called lapita, archaeologists say the original settlers of Polynesia in eastern Pacific trace their origins back to Melanesia, to Solomon Islands actually.

Today, between 70 to 80 percent of the population live a subsistence form of life in their small villages, settlements and islands away from the main urban centres. This number is expected to erode as people move from rural to urban areas for higher education and employment.

FLORA & FAUNA

The main Islands of Solomons are volcanic in origin covered with fast flowing rivers and streams. They are home to many endemic flora and fauna species, which includes the common cardinal lorry.

Current estimates put a total of 4500 plant species and 173 species of birds including the famous megapode bird that nests in the thermal sand of some islands in Central and Western provinces. In the World heritage listed Rennell Island alone, 10 plants and 4 species and nine subspecies of birds have been identified as endemic.

Also endemic is the saltwater sea snake known as the krait. A book written by Solomon Islander environmentalist Patrick Pikacha, titled "Wild West", widely covers wildlife species ranging from birds to butterflies.



CULTURE

Communal, clan and family ties remain strong in these islands with the existence of the Wantok system.

A key part of the Melanesian culture, Wantok means people from the same language group who are blood relatives. They are part of the extended family support and assist one another.

Kastom, the pidgin term for custom, refers to traditional beliefs and land ownership. Despite the predominance of devout Christians, traditional practices are still being followed especially by those living in the hinterland of the country's larger islands.

Off the beaten path, village life remains much as it has been for centuries. While some do welcome strangers, not all do - so ask local authorities first before venturing to visit these remote and far-flung areas.

RELIGION

About 95% of The Population are Christians. The principal religions are church of Melanesia (Anglican) about 25%; Roman Catholic 19%; South Seas Evangelical 17% United Church (Methodist) 11% and Seventh Day Adventist 10%. Other religions have made an impact notably the Baha'i faith, Jehovah's Witness, Assemblies of God and Baptist.

ECONOMY

Driven By high commodity prices, the Solomon Islands economy had been performing quite well in recent years.

In 2007, for instance, the economy grew by 10.3%, the highest in the South Pacific Region for that year.

It slowed down to around 6% in 2008 but an impressive growth rate nevertheless. Much of that growth was attributed to high levels of log exports.

However, experts say current rates of tree felling are unsustainable, restrictions on log harvesting therefore have been imposed.

Good commodity prices for copra, cocoa and fish exports had also been helpful, and also stimulating the economy was the government's expansionary fiscal policy, bulk of which is going towards building and improving infrastructure like roads and bridges.

Because of this and recent wage increases awarded to government workers, consumer spending has been bullish.

That, together with high prices of imported goods, especially fuel, pushed inflation up to peak at 16.5% in 2008.

Commercial bank credit has also been strong, growing by 34.3%.

Like other free market economies, Solomon Islands economy is not immune to the impact of the global financial meltdown. Lesser growth is being projected for 2009 and 2010.

Things might change for the better if the country's sole gold mine Gold ridge overcomes funding issues and commences gold exports soon.

The security and safety that RAMSI brought to the Solomon Islands in 2003 has also provided a strong base for economic growth. New investors in the country are now able to start businesses with a renewed sense of confidence and certainty about the future.




GOVERNMENT

Solomon Islands follow the Westminster system of democracy with the British Monarch retained as head of state and represented in the country by a Governor-General.

The Prime minister, elected by parliament, is the head of government and leads a group of cabinet ministers.

The country's 50 seat parliament is perched on a ridge overlooking Honiara city. Parliamentary representation is based on single-member constituencies.

For local government purposes, the country is divided into 10 administrative areas of which nine are provinces, administered by elected provincial members and the 10th is the city of Honiara, administered by a city council, headed by a mayor.



Solomon Islands have diplomatic relations with a number of countries and has a representative based there.

AIRPORT

Honiara International airport is your gateway into the Solomon Islands. It used to be named Henderson airport after a World War II US air force pilot. The airport is located 12 kms from Honiara city centre. Taxis (approx SBD\$100) and public bus services (Approx SBD\$5) are available on arrival. Most major hotels in Honiara will provide a shuttle bus service (for a fee) if requested in advance. The domestic terminal is located a few hundred metres from the International Terminal.

Inter-terminal and Honiara transfer services can also be arranged through Solomon Islands Terminal Services, who are based at the International Terminal.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS

Citizens of the United States and most (British) commonwealth and European Union countries do not need a visa. If you have a valid passport (minimum 6 months validity from planned date of entry) and a return or onward ticket, you can acquire a visitor's visa valid for three months on arrival. Tourist visas are usually issued for 30 days on arrival. There are some exceptions, so do check with the Solomon Islands Immigration Service on (677) 22179, 22194 or 22199. DRESS CODE

Lightweight (cotton), casual clothing, and comfortable footwear are the usual dress worn. Occasionally, a light sweater may be handy for those rare cool nights. Bikini and other beachwear are acceptable at hotels/ resorts but not when out shopping in towns or visiting villages.

CUSTOMS (DUTY FREE)

200 cigarettes or 250 grams of tobacco, and /or 2 litres of spirit or equivalent. Other dutiable goods ought not to exceed \$\$1500 for gifts or \$\$3000 for personal items.

DEPARTURE TAX

This is usually included in the cost of your airline ticket. (Consult your travel agent)

CLIMATE

The Solomon Islands has a tropical climate with a year round average temperature of about 29°c. Drier months are May through to October. Annual average rainfall is around 2520mm.

TIPPING

Not encouraged or recommended.

TIME ZONE

Eleven hours ahead of Greenwich mean time. One hour ahead of Brisbane, and one hour behind Fiji or Auckland (at non daylight saving time).

CHURCH SERVICES

Most Solomon Islanders are religious and visitors are welcome to attend local services. Check with your hotel reception for direction.

ELECTRICITY

220 - 240 volts is the standard. Australian three pin style plugs are standard. For 110 volts, ask or buy a voltage converter. If your electrical appliances are other international plugs, we recommend you bring an adapter with you.

POST OFFICE

Main post office in Honiara is next to the British high commission on Mendana Avenue. Mail is also processed at post offices in the main provincial centres. Some hotels also handle guest mail. DHL's courier service is available at BJS Building, Point Cruz.

CURRENCY & MONEY EXCHANGE

Solomon Islands dollar (SBD) is the base currency. Notes available in - \$100, \$50, \$20, \$10, and \$5. Coins in - \$2, \$1, 50c, 20c, 10c and 5c. As at 1 March 2013, AUD\$1 = approx SBD\$6.05 ; US\$1 = approx SBD\$7.95. Note rates are subjected to change.

Solomon Post and Solomon Islands Terminal Services operate currency exchange facilities at Honiara International airport. All 'commercial' banks in Honiara, Auki and Gizo handle exchange transactions. Western union agencies will be found in all BSP branches and Solomon Post's main office in Honiara.

Most hotels and resorts will provide currency exchange services for Australian and US dollars. Some overseas airports and banks may exchange Solomon Islands currency, however you should plan on exchanging currency when you arrive in the Solomon Islands.

CREDIT CARDS

MasterCard and Visa accepted at some tourist facilities and restaurants. A surcharge normally applies. American Express is accepted in major hotels in Honiara. Generally speaking, smaller guest houses will only accept cash.

BANKS

There are three main commericial banks: Australia & New Zealand Banking Group Ltd (ANZ), Bank of South Pacific (BSP) and Pan Oceanic Bank (POB) and the newest bank in town is Bred Bank, ATM's in selected locations around Honiara.

Banking Hours 9am to 4pm Mondays to Fridays except Public Holidays. ANZ & BSP Bank operates ATM machines in Honiara, Auki & Gizo.



ACCOMMODATION

HEALTH

The main public hospital is in Honiara with smaller facilities in major provincial centres. Private clinics are also found in Honiara. Malaria medication and prevention is recommended; insect repellent and sleeping under a mosquito net is highly recommended, especially in remote areas.

It is recommended you ensure you are up to date with immunisations for travel to the Solomon Islands. Please consult your doctor in advance of your trip. We recommend you take out comprehensive health and travel insurance for your visit, to cover any unforeseen circumstances.

Tap water should be boiled prior to drinking. Bottled water is readily available in hotels and shops throughout the Solomon Islands.

DINING OUT

NIGHTLIFE

Major hotels provide entertainment with contemporary and cultural performances on certain places like the Point Cruz Yacht Club, the Capitains bar at Pacific Casino Hotel, Club HP at the Heritage Park Hotel and IBS Club at the Iron Bottom Sound Hotel.

Supreme Casino, Honiara Casino and the Coral Sea Resort & Casino offer poker, baccarat, blackjack and roulette for both casual and serious gamblers.

Some nightspots around Honiara offer DJ or live band music.

Another popular hangout is the Golf clubhouse at Ranadi as well as the Ranadi Beach club. In Gizo, check out the PT 109 Koburutavia lodge, named after the WWII boat of the late John f Kennedy who later became President of united States of America, and SB Bar at Sanbis resort. Normal level of care should be observed when going out at night.





TRANSPORT

Sea, air and land transportations are available but the main ones are sea and air.

Ships and canoes powered by outboard motor are cheaper. Because the islands are scattered, roads are only limited to very few places. Most international island ships leaving Honiara depart from the Point Cruz wharf area.

This is generally the best place to find out when boats are leaving. There is a fast cat service between Honiara and Auki (Malaita), whilst other passenger services generally depart once or twice a week. Daily services are available across to Tulagi.

TELECOMMUNICATION & INTERNET SERVICES

Our Telekom has a modern telephone network in Honiara offering IDD telephones in major hotels. Public phones in Honiara and rural centres are accessible to international calls to the rest of the world.

You can easily purchase phone cards through Our Telekom or BeMobile through agencies located throughout the Solomon Islands. Similarly wifi cards can be purchased and major hotels have wifi hotspots. Sim cards for mobile phone and internet use are also available.

Solomon Telekom and BeMobile also have roaming arrangements with number International phone providers. Please check with your phone service provider prior to see if they have mobile roaming arrangements in the Solomon Islands.

MEDIA

Solomon Islands have a vibrant media industry. The Solomons Star is the leading daily newspaper, with other publications being the Island Sun and the Sunday Isles newspapers.

There are 3 commercial FM stations in addition to the national service operated by Solomon Islands Broadcasting Corporation. Stations broadcast mainly in Pidgin, which many visitors find easy to comprehend. They broadcast local music with familiar island beat. Reggae music is also popular. In some areas international services such as BBC and Radio Australia signals can be heard.

Hotels and some residents subscribe to Australia's ABC and BBC service through satellite TV on offer through the Fijibased Sky Pacific service. The Fiji television service also owns emTV in neighbouring Papua New Guinea whose signal can also be picked up in the country.



LANGUAGE

There are about 90 languages in the country. Whilst English is taught in schools and is the official language, locals use a mixture of Melanesian and English called Pidgin to converse.



WORLD WAR II TOURS

Some of the fiercest fighting of the war took place in and around Honiara. Names like Bloody Ridge, Red Beach, Skyline Ridge and Henderson Field will live long in the memories of both sides. Here, in 1942, World War 2's bloodiest and longest campaign saw the loss of nearly 38,000 lives and the turning point of the war in the Pacific. There are many battle sites and relics of the war found not only around Honiara, but also throughout the islands.

Some places to see in and around Honiara include:

Point Cruz

A five-minute walk from major hotels was the centre of many battles. Views to the east and west will give you a good perspective of the terrain. In December 1942, US army guns were lined up almost wheel-to-wheel shelling targets further west.

Betikama School Relics

As you travel from downtown Honiara towards the airport, take the road that goes right just before Lunga Bridge. This takes you to Betikama Seventh Day Adventist School, which is on the west bank of the Lunga River, opposite Henderson airport. This was a US camp area during the battle of Guadalcanal and the 1st marines were on the nearby hills. There are relics on display including a P400, Bren carrier and US and Japanese artillery.

Bonegi

Along the coast west of Kokumbona. Wreck of transport Kinugawa Maru lies at rest on the beach. There is a \$\$20.00 entry fee. Across the road, a trail goes towards an old US firing range that has the gull of a Sherman Jezebel on it. Follow the track a few hundred yards past the tank and you will find a 1943-45 US military dump. A range of equipment was simply dumped down a hillside, including jeep parts, Jerri cans, fuel drums, hundreds of empty whisky and coca cola bottles, etc.

Chinatown

East bank of the Matanikau. This area saw heavy fighting for months. Cross the Matanikau Bridge and then turn right and follow the road along the east bank. Then you come to the 2nd bridge across the river (this was the original bridge site). Look upstream from the middle of this bridge and that's where US wooden footbridges were during the November 1942 fighting.

Henderson Airfield

Japanese Zero propeller on the wall in the lounge. Japanese 75mm AA gun outside the terminal. Plaque to Lofton Henderson. Memorial garden with various plaques and trees dedicated to various units and individuals. A few hundred yards west of the terminal is the 1943 control tower and a memorial to the Edsons Ridge Battle.

Thin Red Line

Cross the Matanikau Bridge and drive two miles south down the east bank. Here, you can wade across the river and hike up the valley towards the area known as the Thin Red Line to see foxholes on Sims ridge. These can be treacherous on the muddy coral ridges after rainfall!

American War Memorial

Located on the ridge behind town. From here you can view many of the battlefield sites & enjoy expansive views across Iron Bottom Sound.

Vilu War Museum

Open air display of relics. Wildcat, P400 remains, corsair, P38, assorted wings, Japanese artillery and lots of smaller items can be found further up the coast towards cape Esperance.

WHERE TO EAT

Apart from eating out in hotel restaurants, Honiara has some decent and guite reasonably priced eateries.

There are those that serve a la carte meals like the oceanview restaurant at the Pacific casino hotel, and Hong Kong Palace on Hibiscus Avenue.

At Honiara hotel, you have the oasis and club havannah, the Golden crown restaurant is in town centre. GETTING AROUND

Taxis are widely available in Honiara. Whilst some have meters, it is advisable to set the price prior to commencing your trip. Ask at your accommodation reception or office prior for an estimate on trip prices. Solomon Islands Visitors Bureau staff can also assist.

Buses generally operate along the main East-West corridor from King George School at the eastern end to Rove and White River to the west. Services also operate inland to up to Naha. Less frequent routes also extend further afield. Fares range from SBD\$3.00 to SBD30.00 depending on distance travelled.

Apart from being home of the country's capital, Honiara, Guadalcanal is a mountainous tropical island. It was the scene of many fierce battles during the Pacific War form 1942 to 1945.

There are very few roads beyond Honiara, which makes access challenging. For the intrepid traveller Guadalcanal abounds in natural wonders.

At the eastern tip lies Marau Sound, an area of turquoise waters dotted with lush tropical islands. From Marau you can access the south side of Guadalcanal, known as the Weather Coast. Here you will find remote villages nestled along a rugged and dramatic coastline.

Iron Bottom Sound, the body of water between Guadalcanal, Nggela Islands and Savo is so-called because the sea channel is the watery graves for many warships and fighter planes - allied and Japanese alike.

There are a number of inland treks that will take you to waterfalls and to visit villages and through lush rainforest. A guide is essential for such trips. These can be arranged through local villages or with assistance from Solomon Islands Visitors Bureau office in Honiara.

WHERE TO EAT

There are few places to eat outside your accommodation. Kirakira station has a couple of takeaway food outlets. Base provisions can be obtained from stores in Kirakira and there is a fresh produce market.

GETTING AROUND

Solomon Airlines fly from Honiara to Kirakira about 4 times per week and there are weekly flights to Santa Ana and Arona. Infrequent passenger/cargo ships sail form Honiara to Makira province. You should check at the interisland wharf area at Point Cruz in Honiara. There is no road system around Makira and transport is generally via motorised cance or long boat.







Comprising three main islands in the extreme east, Temotu offers a historical and culturally unique experience for visitors.

The French La Perouse wrecks were found here and Spanish explorer Álvaro de Mendana entered the Solomons' archipelago through Temotu, proven by sites of a Spanish village he attempted to build.

The country's most active volcano is at Tinakula and the unique red feather money is found here. Ancient and massive Kauri trees grow at Vanikoro and Santa Cruz. In addition, if you are a surfer, perfect curls can be found at Carlise Bay.

THINGS TO DO

DIVING

The Temotu Province offers some of the remotest diving sites in the world. Diving can be done from Ngarando Island resort in the Reef islands (refer accommodation listing for contacts). Wall dives, drop offs, coral gardens & fish life are some of spectacular dives that one must not miss in this area.

FISHING

The waters of the Temotus abound with fish life and the chance for a range of fishing opportunities. You can troll along the sheer drop-offs for Spanish mackerel, wahoo and dogtooth tuna or cast into the surf for giant trevally, red bass and coral trout. Try your luck with a line, a spear, a net or even other fishing tactics the locals used to catch different types of fish. The islands are remote and surrounded by sea, you are bound to catch something.

SURFING

In the Temotus only few breaks have really been discovered. Be the first to surf new breaks in one of the world's last frontiers. Surfing is enjoyed more by children and done as a fun recreational activity. They use plywood piece or broken dugout canoe as surf boards. Wooden canoes are mostly used to ride waves. Be amongst them where they will cheer you up with their endless laughter.

TREKKING & ADVENTURE

Trekking is part of everyday life in the islands. To travel to another village you will need to walk as all of the island group have no access to motor vehicles expect the capital Lata.

Experience the wild rooster hunting. These roosters believed to have been brought by Alvaro de Mendana, a Spanish Explorer when he landed on Gracious Bay to settle here.

Travel by boat to view the only live volcano, Tinakula with elevation of 851m above sea level. It erupts every hour in plume of ash & rocks. The first eruption as far as the records shows was in 1595. Polynesian people occupy southern part of the volcano since then, but have to be evacuated in 1971 when another eruption occurred. Now the volcano is deserted.
